Are Built in LPW's Woodworking Shop

etirement years offer lots of hope for gaining new skills – along with added time for pursuing them. One of Lake Prince Woods' best amenities for learning and exploring is its remarkable woodworking shop. It's a well-equipped getaway for building, restoring, repairing, experimenting, and bringing to life ideas born in the imagination.

The Founding Trio

Within weeks of Lake Prince Woods' initial opening in 2002, Wes Hunt, Bill Winner, and Bill Cloe met as new residents and wanted to establish a woodworking shop. They were given a third of the original maintenance shop to house it and used their skills to build a wall separating the two spaces, generating 900 square feet of dedicated shop space with 12' high ceilings. Furnishing the shop originally were a few pieces of basic equipment: a plain saw, a jointer, and a raised saw. That was soon to change.

Before retiring, Bill Winner had been a cabinet maker, and he brought his own drill press to the shop. Bill Cloe, a banker who made toys as a hobby, brought a band saw and miscellaneous tools to help set up the space. He used the proceeds of his toy-making to raise money for the shop. Wes Hunter had no experience in woodworking when he met the other two men, but once he learned from them, he started a cottage industry of sorts, creating more than 100 jewelry boxes over the years, along with a selection of other beautiful items.

Building Out the Shop

To help build out the shop, the three men made repairs to residents' furniture for a fee; otherwise, residents approached them with project ideas and paid for the necessary materials while the men spearheaded the assembly and the finishing touches. As a team, Wes and the two Bills designed and built a table for the Portsmouth Room and a cabinet for the Assisted Living area. In time, other residents joined the group, some with experience and others just eager to learn the fundamentals of woodworking. Some of them also donated equipment for the workshop, adding to its scope and capabilities.

To help with cleanup, Lake Prince Woods received a grant for a dust-collecting system, which connects to all the major machinery and prevents sawdust from permeating the space. Steven Smith, a seasoned woodworker, and his wife Wendy made a generous donation of cedar and white and red oak from their own storage unit, making a wealth of raw material available for projects. When Hurricane Isabella came through eastern Virginia and felled trees on campus, they were milled for lumber and the boards stored in the shop for anyone to use.

The Next Generation

These days, following Bill Cloe's passing, David Liles, Wes Hunt, Robert Morell, and Walter Hammerle are the veteran woodworkers in the shop. David makes tabletop cornhole games sold in the gift shop, along with bluebird houses, and Wes Hunt continues to make his signature jewelry boxes. Walter, who was a woodworker before

moving to Lake Prince Woods, fixes furniture for residents and collaborates with Wes and Robert. Walter also kindly donated a lot of his equipment to the shop.

All of these men carry on the love of woodworking that Bill Cloe helped cultivate when the shop was first opened. Even today, his legacy lives on, thanks to projects he's shared with the greater community. Fire Station 6 in Suffolk (which serves Lake Prince Woods) displays a wooden fire truck of poplar and walnut that he made as a gift for the firefighters. He also created a wooden train for Lake Prince Woods' post office area that features an engine and 10 cars. Each year during the holidays, the handcrafted model is set out for folks to enjoy. He's also graced families and friends with rocking horses, pickup trucks, fire trucks, bulldozers, dump trucks, and furniture of all kinds.

New Woodworkers Wanted

Anyone who's interested in woodworking, no matter their level of experience, is welcome to visit the shop and talk more with the men who frequent it. David Liles holds the keys to the shop and refers to it as, "A gem in the raw that's not being used." The space is incredibly well stocked with machinery and accessories to prompt all sorts of creativity, along with a readymade supply of wood that would be expensive to purchase on its own.

Permeating the space is a spirit of generosity that characterizes the woodworkers who came before; it serves as a spark of inspiration for fledging and future crafters. With a little guidance, anyone – male or female - can explore, play, and experiment at their leisure. After all, there's no time like retirement to discover a new skill - and a new love!

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
